

Crowds Enjoy Art and Culture Walk Throughout Town

The Kodiak Arts Council hosted the second annual Art and Culture Walk last Friday. Various businesses and organizations kept their doors open late to give community members a chance to view local art in all its many forms. While gray skies and drizzles may have kept some spectators from walking to the nine different businesses displaying art, it certainly didn't bar them from attending completely.

Kate Helligso is the event coordinator for the Kodiak Arts Council and played a major role in organizing this year's walk. Helligso stood on the main stage of the Gerald C. Wilson Auditorium Friday evening and beamed at community members browsing the dozens of art works on display. The stage was one stop along the walk, and home to the End of Summer Art Show.

Helligso said her passion for art began in Kodiak, and organizing an event like this seemed like the right thing to do.

Tom Quass is now the former executive director for the Arts Council. His last day was Friday, and he said the art walk was a fitting finale for his three years with the organization.
